QUESTION OF: How to fight the war on drugs in the globalization era

The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crimes,

1. Urges all member states to implement stronger border control to prevent drug trafficking in ways such as but not limited to:
 - a. Strengthening border control on countries that have been strongly associated with drug production such as but not limited to:
 - i. Afghanistan,
 - ii. Myanmar,
 - iii. Guatemala,
 - iv. Honduras,
 - b. Encouraging the ECOSOC to consider increasing fines on individuals/groups who are proved to be involved in the illicit transport of drugs,
 - c. Enforcing mandatory regulations of UN PeaceKeepers at borders in ways such as but not limited to:
 - i. Using detection dogs before and after mail packages pass between countries borders,
 - ii. Requesting UN funding for member states who share a border with countries that have been strongly associated with drug production;
2. Advises Member States to disincentivize the illicit trafficking of drugs with approaches such as, but not limited to:
 - a. Implementing laws that dictate criminal punishments for the illegal cultivation, manufacture, and distribution of highly addictive drugs such as, but not limited to:
 - i. Heroine,
 - ii. Cocaine,
 - iii. Methamphetamine,
 - iv. Amphetamine,
 - b. Further enforcing customs and border controls by, but not limited to:
 - i. Introducing modern security equipment,
 - ii. Increasing the frequency of drug testing,
 - iii. Instructing a certain proportion of security workers on new forms of drug smuggling,
 - c. Funding institutions that inspect farms and fields to ensure that no illegal drug is being cultivated, using methods such as, but not limited to:
 - i. Patrol groups,
 - ii. Analytical drones;
3. Encourages all Member States to create a campaign similar to the annual wastewater campaign undertaken by the Sewage Analysis Core Group Europe (SCORE) to speculate drug use in ways such as, but not limited to:

- a. Analyzing sewage water in all populated areas to calculate levels of different illicit drugs, leading to further action such as, but not limited to:
 - i. Studying the popularity of different drugs,
 - ii. Looking for data on usage of specific drugs;
